

Anna Henning House – 405 Bench Street – 1911 – Bakery Owner

Anna Henning was born on December 3, 1873, in Galena Illinois. Some records show her being born in 1872, and others (including her gravestone) show 1873.

Anna was the daughter of Conrad and Elizabeth Louisa (Frantz) Henning.

Her father Conrad was born on June 7, 1836, in Hesse, Germany. He passed away on April 29, 1899, in Galena, Illinois. He started his bakery business in Galena in 1865, and the tradition was continued by his children after his passing.

Her mother Elizabeth Louisa was born on May 6, 1839, in Hesse, Germany. She passed away on August 13, 1903, in Galena, Illinois. She was a housewife and mother.

Conrad and Louisa were married on March 22, 1866. Their obituaries state a different number of children born to the union. His obituary states eight children, yet her obituary states seven children. The seven that were mentioned in various articles (besides Anna) are as follows:

Possibly a son John was born in the early years of marriage, but nothing could be found on him, except a listing in ancestry.com. Since no other mention was made, possibly this was either incorrect or the son died shortly after birth??

A daughter Louisa was born in 1867 but passed away at the young age of ten in November of 1877.

A son Emil was born in 1868 and passed away on July 18, 1900. He never married.

A daughter Augusta “Gussie” was born in 1870. She married Henry Mahlmann in 1897, but later divorced. She eventually moved back to Galena with her children and lived with Anna. She passed away on December 20, 1931.

A daughter Caroline “Carrie” was born in 1875. She married Dr. Coleman Hoffman in 1909. He passed away in 1936. She later married William Beckman and moved out west. No articles were found mentioning her date of death.

A son Louis was born on April 12, 1878. He married Gertrude Duggan, and they later moved to Nebraska. He passed away on October 4, 1946.

A son Alfred Claus was born on October 12, 1881. He married Anna Steigner in 1908. He passed away on May 14, 1928.

Anna never married. She originally lived with her parents and family in houses on Main, High, and Dodge Streets according to some of the articles. She lived in a couple of other locations with her sister Augusta and children before building the house at 405 Bench Street.

Anna once worked as an assistant to a local doctor, but most of her career was working in and later having ownership in the family bakery.

Anna was very active in both the community and church organizations. A few to mention were Grant’s Birthday celebration committees, the Ladies Aid Society of the First Presbyterian Church, the Women’s Auxiliary, Pythian Sisters organization, the Community Council and the Red Cross.

Newspaper articles found while searching under the family name of Henning were found up until 1952. Not much was found after that year pertaining to Anna. The articles included below start with those involving her father starting the family business, to her brothers in their business lives, to her sisters and their families, and the rest about Anna and her church and community involvement.

One record was found that showed Anna’s date of death on February 5, 1958. Another stated the year was 1953. Could be either date.

Galena Daily Gazette – September 2, 1874 – father's accident

<p>Thrown from a Water Cart.</p> <p>This afternoon, Mr. C. Henning of the firm of Sanders & Henning, confectioners, while proceeding to the pump at the corner of Spring Street after water, was thrown from his cart, by the sudden jumping to one side of his horse which became frightened, and precipitated to the ground in a violent manner, directly forward and under one of the wheels, which ran over and fractured the right foot. Mr.</p>	<p>Henning, in falling, struck the back part of his head against a stone, causing a severe contusion of the scalp, and a slight depression of the skull. He was conveyed to his room over the store, and was attended by Dr. Weirich & Son. His physician pronounced his injuries serious, though not fatal.</p>

Galena Daily Gazette – December 14, 1874 – father's business purchase

Messrs. Sanders & Henning, confectioners, have purchased the building they occupy, and the one adjoining, toward the GAZETTE office, with a view of enlarging their boundaries in the spring.

Galena Daily Gazette – June 9, 1875 – father's 39th birthday

His 39th Birthday.

Mr. Conrad Henning celebrated his thirty-ninth birthday on last Monday evening, giving a supper to a few chosen friends in honor of the event. During the evening the Galena Saengerbund serenaded the gentleman and discoursed the sweet music which we inadvertently placed to the credit of the Humboldt Society, now disbanded. Mr. Henning invited the musicians in, and he and his friends had a jolly time until quite late in the evening. The celebrated "bock beer" furnished by the gentleman was relished exceedingly by his guests.

Galena Daily Gazette – January 19, 1877 – mother's accident

Accidents.

Mrs. Conrad Henning slipped and fell upon the icy steps at the rear of the store of Sanders & Henning, last evening, dislocating her left shoulder and sustaining other though slight bruises about the body. Dr. Weirich attended the lady.

Galena Daily Gazette – November 15, 1877 – death of sister Louisa

The funeral of Louise, eldest daughter of Conrad and Elizabeth Henning, aged 10 years, took place from the family residence on Main Street, at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

Galena Daily Gazette – June 13, 1879 – father tries business out west but returns to Galena

Returned Home for Good.

The many friends of Messrs. Conrad Henning and Antone Foecke will be pleased to learn that these gentlemen returned home Wednesday evening, from Colorado and Nebraska, having failed in their efforts to find a better place in which to do business, than Galena. During their extensive travels in the gold and silver regions, they found everything magnified and overdone, and a vast num-

ber of disgusted fortune hunters, who after spending all their money in the vain search for wealth, were left destitute in a land where the virtue, Charity, is seldom exercised. At Denver, Messrs. Henning and Foecke hired a team, and traveled five hundred miles, visiting Leadville and other mining localities during the journey. They have come back to Galena to stay.

Galena Daily Gazette – August 23, 1882 – father's bakery business change

Sanders & Henning, the well known bakers and confectioners, of this city, have made arrangements to dissolve partnership, the dissolution to take effect on the first day of September. Mr. Henning will continue the business in all its branches at the old stand, and Mr. Sanders will engage in business somewhere in Minnesota.

Galena Daily Gazette – October 11, 1882 – father's illness

Conrad Henning, formerly of the firm of Sanders & Henning, is confined to the house with a severe case of inflammation of the lungs.

Galena Daily Gazette – May 15, 1884 – father's bakery business

Another New Enterprise in Galena.

Conrad Henning, formerly of the firm of Sanders & Henning, has finally determined to engage in the bakery and confectionery business in Galena. When Sanders & Henning dissolved partnership two years ago, they owned two stores on Main street. In dividing up the property, Mr. Sanders took the store which the firm were then occupying, where he continued the business. Mr. Henning took the store next door south, and has had it rented most of the time since, while he has been superintending a bakery at Darlington. He has now come home, and has commenced fitting up his store to open out business. He will erect a building in the rear of the store for a bakery, and will put in a new patent oven, which is heated with coke, and does better baking than the old style ovens. He will go to Chicago to-morrow to purchase the oven. Mr. Henning served a regular apprenticeship at the bakery trade in Germany, and understands the details of the business. He will bake bread, cakes, pies, etc., and will manufacture candies.

Galena Daily Gazette – June 19, 1884 - father's bakery business

C. Henning has received his stock of confectionery and store fixtures, and will be open in a few days. The front of his store has been neatly painted and lettered and new counters and shelving erected. Four elegant show cases with neat glass trays for the display of confectionery adorn the place, and he will doubtless enjoy a good trade.

Galena Daily Gazette – April 26, 1888 – father's business upgrades

Mr. C. Henning has placed a handsome soda water fountain in his confectionary establishment, and will soon put a new plate glass front in his building.

Galena Daily Gazette – August 4, 1888 – brother Emil's trip/illness

Emil Henning returned home last evening from Marshalltown, Iowa, where he went to spend his summer vacation. While there he was taken ill of intermittent fever, and though convalescent he was unable to be about to-day.

Galena Daily Gazette – July 21, 1891 – fire at father's business

It Was a Close Call.

A big blaze in C. Henning's store was narrowly averted last night. A man passing by about 1 o'clock in the night discovered a blaze that had attacked the wood work of one of the show windows. He succeeded in arousing Mr. Henning, who was asleep up stairs, and together they put out the fire. A lot of pyrotechnics occupied the shelves just above the blaze, which would have reached them in two minutes more, when it would have been impossible to save the building.

The fire was caused by a leak in the gas-meter. The escaping gas was ignited the day before, and in closing up Mr. Henning forgot to extinguish it. An alarm was turned in, but the fire was out before the hose companies could reach it.

Galena Daily Gazette – January 31, 1893 – father's accident/injury

Mr. C. Henning, proprietor of the Vienna bakery, is confined to his home as the result of an accident. While descending the steps on Green street leading from Bench up to Prospect street the other evening he slipped on the ice and fell half the length of one flight. Although bruised and sore from his fall he escaped serious injury and will be able to attend to business in a few days. The wonder is that more accidents of this kind do not occur here.

Galena Daily Gazette – July 14, 1893 – father's accident/injury

Mr. Conrad Henning, proprietor of the Vienna bakery, is confined to his home, suffering from a severe case of blood poisoning in the leg. His condition was brought on by an accident sustained in Dubuque about two weeks ago. He had arrived there from Cassville and was obliged to run to catch a train for home. While running he struck a switch bar and was thrown down and his leg was severely bruised and flayed. He thought nothing of the accident at the time and was down town in a day or two, but blood poisoning set in some days ago. He is reported somewhat better to-day.

Alfred Henning, son of Conrad Henning, met with an accident at noon to-day which nearly cost him his life. The family driving horse was running loose on Spring street with other horses and he attempted to catch it, but the horse would not be caught. Striking out with a hind leg it dealt the young man a terrific kick on the forehead, just over the right eye. The kick made a cut several inches long and fractured the frontal bone. With great pluck the injured boy placed his handkerchief over the wound and ran

DEATH OF CONRAD HENNING

The Rude Hand of Death Again
Takes Away One of Galena's
Valuable Citizens.

After a Sickness of Only One Week He
Succumbed to that Dreaded Disease

a serious case of pneumonia. Owing to his well-known powerful physique and strong constitution his family entertained little doubt of his ultimate recovery in a short while, but, alas, they were doomed to disappointment. Despite the most careful nursing and skilled medical attendance the hand of death could not be stayed and his great suffering came to an end at 10:20 o'clock Saturday night when he drew his last breath and the noble heart ceased to beat.

Conrad Henning was born June 7, 1836, at Abterode, Kreis Aschwege in Hesse, Germany. In the year 1850 he began to learn the baker's trade at Cassel. After having mastered that trade he became desirous of trying to better his financial condition in far-off America and accordingly took his departure for this country, arriving in New York City in the year 1854. From there he went to Canada where he remained one year, after which he came west to Fountain City, Wis. Soon after he began work on the Mississippi River packets as cook in which he was quite proficient. This work he continued until the breaking out of the civil war, laboring under some of the old and well-known captains, such as Capt. Harris, Burns and others. When the war cloud gathered over this fair land and the call for volunteers came he enlisted in the First Minnesota Cavalry at St. Paul and served with distinction in that splendid body of troops until he was taken prisoner and held for a long time after which he was exchanged and sent home. In 1865 he started in the baker's and confectioner's business in this city in which he was engaged at the time of his death and in which he established an

enviable reputation for honesty and square dealing. Mr. Henning was united in marriage with Miss Louise Frantz of this city March 22, 1860, who survives to mourn a great loss in the death of her great-hearted husband. To this union were born eight children whose names are as follows: Emil C., Mrs. Augusta J. Mahlman, Anna K., Carrie, Louis J. and Alfred C. All of the children reside at home with the exception of Mrs. Mahlman whose home is in Chicago. He also has two brothers and four sister living, and his step-mother who resides at Fountain City, Wis.

This community can ill afford to lose a man like Conrad Henning. So far as his ability went he was a public benefactor and he is deeply mourned by a city full of friends. Though not rich in this world's goods as the term is now applied, his great, generous heart could not bear to know of serious suffering and privation without making an effort to alleviate it. He was generous from principle and from choice, but with it went a whole-souled benevolence and his kindness of disposition was proverbial. In his charities it was his nature to give without letting his right hand know what his left hand was doing. He had a warm friend in every business man in the city and many and sincere were the expressions of regret heard on every hand when the news of his death gained circulation. He was the soul of good nature and though he had seen sixty-three years of life he was as vivacious and fond of the social amenities as a man of half that age. No man would be more greatly missed from the family circle, where he was an excellent husband and loving father, or from the community where he was a most highly valued citizen.

The funeral will be held to-morrow afternoon at 2 o'clock at St. John's German Lutheran church of which he was a member for many years past, Rev. Paul Schmidt officiating. Services at the grave in Greenwood cemetery will be conducted by Stuber Lodge of Odd Fellows of which he was a member.

The building was quite inadequate in size to contain the vast throng of friends of the bereaved family who desired to evidence their esteem and high regard for the departed citizen by their attendance at the solemn services. This in itself was a sufficient indication of the respect in which he was held by his fellowtownsmen and was a touching, though mute funeral sermon. The larger part of the membership of the three Odd Fellows lodges in the city were in attendance and presented an imposing aspect as they formed in a long column and escorted the remains of their beloved brother to the silent city of the dead. Mr. Henning was a veteran member of Steuben Lodge and also of Galena Encampment, No. 132. On arriving at Greenwood cemetery the members of Steuben Lodge exemplified the burial rites of that order as the casket was lowered to its final resting place. The floral tributes were abundant and most beautiful, silent tokens of sincere friendship. The pall bearers were G. H. Rottler, Frank Kempter and Henry Schumacher from the city and Martin Blum, George C. Biesmann and Albert Schaeffer from Steuben Lodge.

The exact nature of his ailment and the causes leading thereto are not known but the immediate cause of dissolution was congestion of the brain.

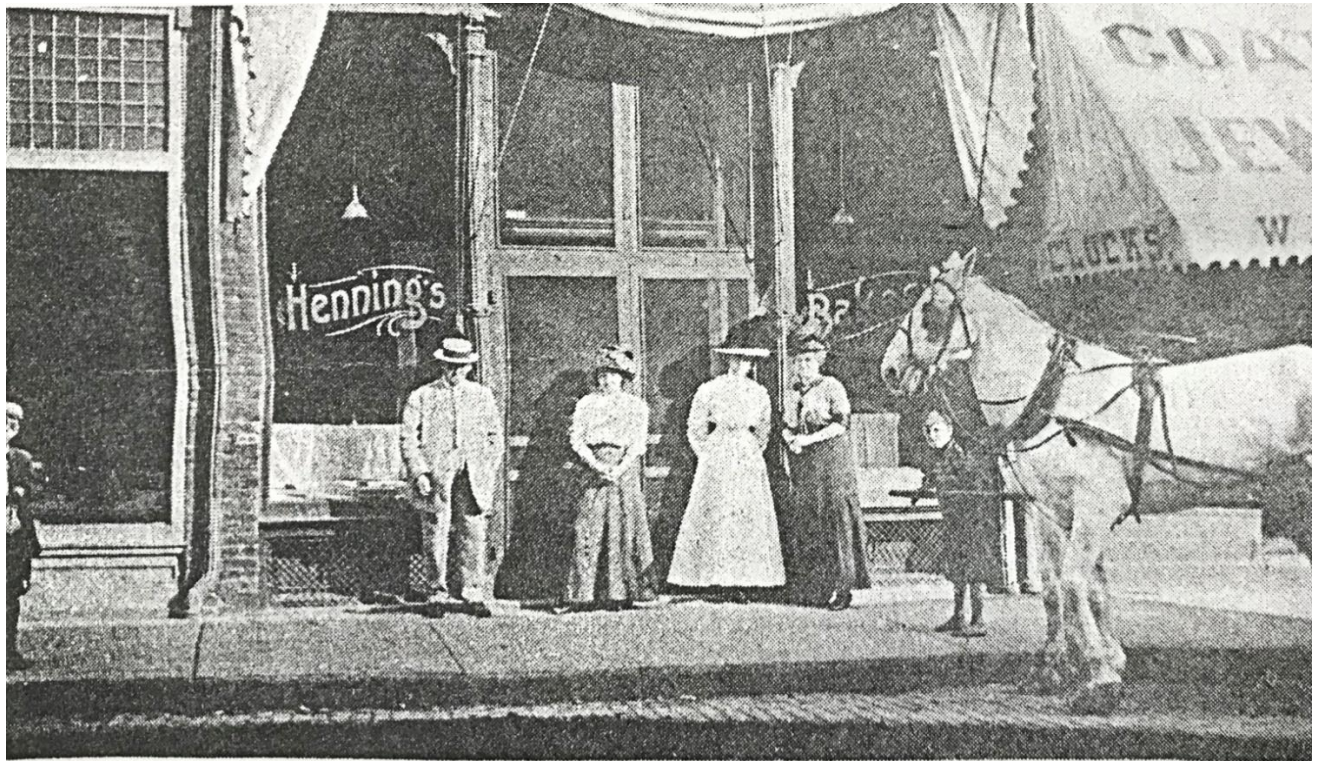

EARLY DAY BANKING HOUSE

Old McKinley House one of Galena's First Business Institutions.

The razing of the old McKinley property on Bench street to make room for the erection of a modern dwelling house for Miss Anna Henning, obliterates one of Galena's first business enterprises.

It was in this house, that the first bank in the city was established. It was known as the Galena branch of the State Bank of Illinois and went into operation on December 5, 1835. Its officers were Daniel Wann, president; Wm. C. Bostwick, cashier. Mr. Wann was succeeded by Frederick Stahl about 1840. E. W. Turner was cashier in 1838-'9, and was succeeded by a Mr. Campbell. The bank ceased the transaction of banking business in 1842, and its affairs were wound up by the president and cashier about 1846 or '47.

But little could be learned of the bank's early history as there is no one living in this city that remembers anything about the early history, except that the bank was located on Bench street and there was a watch tower or fort located on the hill just above the bank. The old vault was in an excellent state of preservation when razed by the workmen for the erection of the new building.

There are always crusty, brown loaves of bread on the kitchen table at the U. S. Grant's Home State Historic Site.

They remind the visitor touring the house that baking was probably a daily chore when the mansion on Bouthillier Street was home to the Ulysses S. Grants after the Civil War.

But perhaps, too, some of the breads, rolls, cakes, cookies and other delicacies from the big bakery down on Galena's South Main Street found their way to the Grant larder. Former President Grant might have liked a jelly-filled bismarck with a steaming cup of breakfast coffee, or perhaps Julia Dent Grant served the bakery's tiny tea cakes to an afternoon caller.

Recently, two granddaughters of Conrad Henning, one of the owners of the bakery during a period of Grant's residence in Galena, traced the history of the business from the 1870's to the present time.

In 1874, Conrad Henning and Louis Sanders purchased two side-by-side South Main Street buildings. Today, the building at 118 South Main Street still houses a bakery, while the one next door, 116 South Main Street, is the location of The Cracked Pot antique shop.

The two men started a bakery business. Henning . . . who at the age of 14 went to school in Kassel, Germany, for a year and received a master baker diploma . . . was the baker. Sanders served as the business manager of the firm.

When Henning first came to Galena, he was a cook on a Mississippi River packet boat. He met Sanders and the two men formed the business partnership.

Henning and his wife, Louisa, lived above the one side of the building that is still the bakery and their seven children were born there. Sanders and his wife, Christina, and their family took up residence over the adjoining building.

Both buildings were used as one large bakery, with a doorway between, until September, 1822, when Henning and Sanders dissolved their partnership. The doorway was closed and Henning had his bakery in the south building and Sanders operated a bakery in the north building, doing his baking in a small building on Commerce Street, where the Galena State Bank and Trust Co., is now located.

Miss Mahlman and Mrs. Fehlman continue the story:

When Conrad Henning died in 1899, his son, Alfred, and daughters, Caroline and Anna, carried on the business. Caroline left the bakery after her marriage to Dr. Coleman L. Hoffman and Augusta Mahlman joined Alfred and Anna Henning in the store. The three were partners until the death of Alfred in 1928.

According to Mrs. Fehlman and Miss Mahlman, Augusta Mahlman and Anna Henning operated the bakery until Mrs. Mahlman's death in 1931 . . . then Miss Henning was the sole operator until she was joined in 1943 by Mrs. Mahlman's son, Frederick, a baker.

After Anna Henning's retirement, Frederick Mahlman stayed at the bakery for several years, then sold it because of ill health . . . it became O'Dell's Bakery and a long line of family ownership ended.

The next owners of the bakery were Ray and Betty Bechen. They sold the business to Ron and Marge Nelson, the present owners, in 1973.

In the early days of the bakery, the bread, roll and coffee cake doughs were mixed by hand in long troughs, then kneaded and left to rise overnight. For a good many years, until bread and cake mixers were put to use, everything was mixed by hand.

The bread . . . white, wheat, Vienna, Irish and rye . . . was baked on the hearth in a coke oven, where the fire was on the side.

Around the early 1900's, the fragrant loaves

of fresh bread, unwrapped, were shipped in large wooden baskets on the Illinois Central Railroad to Scales Mound, Apple River, Warren and Council Hill.

That means of delivery came to an end with the advent of commercial bakeries in nearby cities. Bakery goods were distributed throughout the area in trucks, supplying grocery stores.

Up until about 1940, the prices for baked goods were something to dream about today. Bread was five cents for a one-pound loaf, or six loaves were 25 cents; slab cakes were 30 cents each, or you could buy half a cake for 15 cents.

Frosted rolls were 10 cents a dozen and an iced stollen cost 15 cents. Delicious jelly doughnuts, or bismarcks, were only 20 cents a dozen; apple-filled coffee cakes were 10 and

15 cents each and cookies were 15 cents a dozen.

In the 1920's and 1930's, one side of the bakery became a candy store. The American Candy Company was the supplier and rich chocolates, delicate bon bons and confections of all kinds filled the cases, while jars and jars of hard candies lined the shelves and the counter.

The cousins, Miss Mahlman and Mrs. Fehlman, say they take pride in the fact that their grandfather was one of the founders of the bakery that has been in the same location in Galena for so many years.

For one building to have been used for the same purpose for more than a century is quite a record," they agree.

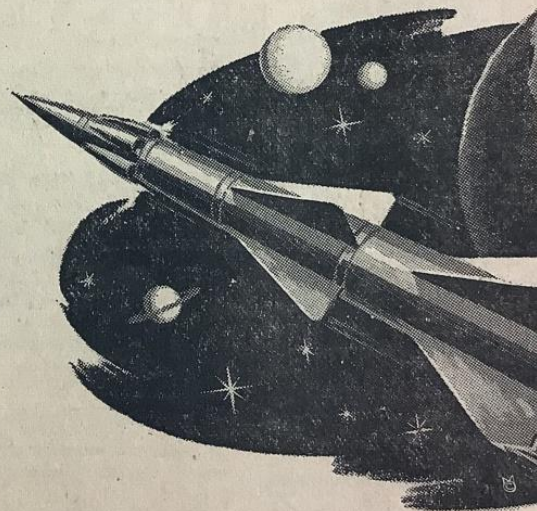
