

Michael McGuire House – 407-409 S Bench Street – 1891

This research document is about the first owner of the house at 407-409 S. Bench Street. It was originally built for Michael McGuire, a laborer (and later a landlord) in 1891.

The information included here about Michael and his family is a compilation of what can be gathered from ancestry and newspaper archive sources. We are not genealogy experts (we are local volunteers) and we try to include anything we can find on the first owner of the home, as well as those who completed major additions to the house, if applicable. Sometimes different sources provide contradicting information, particularly with dates, so we do our best to try and include what we believe is correct. The current homeowner is encouraged to do further research on their own to see if they can find even more information, articles or pictures to add to this research binder.

There was more than one Michael McGuire in the area at that time. There was a man by the same name who lived in Vinegar Hill and was County Clerk/County Treasurer for many years. Reading the articles, it appears that this was not the same man who built the house on Bench Street. At times, it was difficult to discern which Michael McGuire was being written about, so some of the articles may – or may not – be him.

Introduction

Michael McGuire was born in Galena, Illinois in 1847. Find-a-Grave information states he was born in 1847, but other sources, such as Ancestry, show the year of birth as 1849. We believe 1847 is correct, but that is not a confirmed fact.

His father was (also) Michael McGuire, who was born in 1810 in Ireland. His parents are listed as unknown in Ancestry. His occupation was listed as a farmer in census reports. He died on July 24, 1888.

His mother was Mary Ann Smith McGuire, who was born in 1812 in Ireland. Her parents are listed as unknown in Ancestry. She died on March 31,

1892. Both Mary Ann and Michael are buried in St. Michael's Cemetery in Galena, along with their son John.

Michael is believed to have four siblings. They were as follows:

- **Anne McGuire Donegan. She was born in November of 1837 in New York. She married Bernard Donegan. They had two daughters, Anna and Mary Ellen, and one son, John August Donegan (1869-1947). She died in January of 1931 and is buried in St. Michael's Cemetery.**
- **John McGuire (1840-1869). There is minimal information on him. According to Find-a-Grave, he died in 1869 by suicide and is buried in St. Michael's Cemetery with his parents. No mention was made of a wife or children.**
- **James McGuire (1842-?). No further information was found on him.**
- **Ellen McGuire Berry (1844 - 1937). She married Thomas F. Berry (1850-1931). They had two sons, John Michael Berry (1880-1941) and Thomas Francis Berry (1884-1966). Ellen and her husband Thomas are both buried in St. Michael's Cemetery.**

Michael married Catherine A. ("Kitty") Berry McGuire on January 28, 1879 at St. Michael's Church in Galena. They were both 31 years of age when they married. An interesting note here is that Catherine is the sister of Thomas Berry – who married Michael's sister Ellen the following month!!

Catherine was born on July 10, 1848 in Rawlins Township in Galena. Her father was John Edward Berry (1812-1872) who was born in Ireland. Her mother was Mary Martin Berry (1815-1855) who was also born in Ireland. They are both buried in St. Michael's Cemetery in Galena. (Birth year for her mother may have been incorrectly listed as 1825 – which does not make sense for the birth date of daughter Mary – unless her dates are wrong).

Catherine had four siblings. They were as follows:

- **Thomas F. Berry (1850-1931), who married Michael's sister Ellen McGuire. They had two sons (see notes above).**

- **Mary Louise Berry (1834? -1902).** The only mention of this sister was in her obituary in 1902 as a member of a convent all her adult life. She was known as Mother Mary Louise of Ottawa, Illinois.
- **Edward Joseph Berry (aka John E. Berry) (1853-1930).** He is shown as having two wives (no date/death on the first marriage to Matilda Berry). His second wife was Caroline Berry (1851-1934). His children were C.J. Howd Berry (1876-?), Thomas R. Berry (1880-1955), Margaret M. Berry (1884-1978), Angus E. Berry (1888-1936), Donald A. Berry (1890-1952), and Joseph L. Berry (1892-1950).
- **Emily Berry Manley (1844-1927).** She married Michael Manley (1845-1908). They had eleven children. They were as follows: Gilbert Manley (1869-1903), Mary Manley (1870-?), Joseph Michael Manley (1871-1927), Amelia Emily Manley Kelling (1874-1938), John Alois Manley (1878-1936), Margaret C. Manley (1880-1946), Katie Manley (1882-1899), Helen Manley (1886-1975), Elizabeth Mary Manley (1888-?), Louise Manley (1888-1957) and Vincent Manley (?-?).

Michael and Catherine McGuire are known to have had seven children. They were as follows:

- **Mary Emily McGuire Kemler (1880 – November 6, 1946).** She married John Kemler (1883-1951) on September 14, 1909 in Galena. They later moved to Omaha, Nebraska. They had seven children as follows: Mary Catherine Kemler Palik (1911-1996), Helen E. Kemler (1912-1922), John Michael Kemler (1914-1979), Joseph F. Kemler (1915-1989), Harold R. Kemler (1919-1922), Raymond Frederick Kemler (1921-1982), and Robert Edmund Kemler (1923-1991). An obituary article mentions a son Leo, but no information was found on him – unless that was a nickname for one of the sons, possibly? Mary Emily died in 1946 and is buried in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery in Omaha, Nebraska. Both her father Michael and husband John are buried in the same location.

- **James Bernard McGuire (October 1, 1890 – June 3, 1963).** He married Gertrude Adeline Penner (1897-1995) in 1919. They later moved to Omaha, Nebraska as well. They had six children as follows: Richard Bernard McGuire (1920-1995), Joseph Howard McGuire (1922-1983), Betty Jane McGuire Sullivan (1924-1980), William Eugene McGuire (1926-2008), Joyce Ann McGuire Koziol (1931-2011), and James Edward McGuire (1934-2010). James died in 1963 and is buried with his wife in Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Omaha, Nebraska.
- **Augustus McGuire** died at age six in Galena. No dates of birth or death were found. He is buried in the same location as his mother.
- **Thomas McGuire** died at age three months in Galena. No dates of birth or death were found. He is buried in the same location as his mother. He may have been a twin based on how he is listed with a sister on the headstone. An article from August 1, 1885 mentions the death of a three-month-old infant from cholera, but no name was given. This could have been him or his sister?
- **Louise McGuire** died at age three months in Galena. No dates of birth or death were found. She is buried in the same location as her mother. She may have been a twin based on how she is listed with a brother on the headstone.
- **Joseph McGuire** died at age two in Galena. No dates of birth or death were found. He is buried in the same location as his mother.
- **John M. McGuire.** No information was found on this child, other than his name being listed as a child of the couple.

Michael McGuire's occupation was listed as a laborer, but it was also mentioned that he farmed in his Nebraska obituary. No other specifics were found as to the detailed type of work that he did.

In the 1900 census, Michael, Catherine and their children Mary (18) and James (9) were living on Diagonal Street in Galena and paying rent there. He lists himself as "landlord" which leads us to believe they were renting out their Bench Street home at that time (ten years after it was built).

Another article mentions him living/renting on Franklin Street at one time. He moved several times, but he did live on Bench Street originally and returned there years later.

Catherine “Kitty” McGuire died on January 29, 1910 in Galena at 62 years of age. Her obituary lists survivors as her husband Michael, her son James of Kansas City, and her daughter Mary Kemler of Omaha. She is buried in St. Michael’s Cemetery in Galena. There is a picture at the end of this document of her headstone that also is engraved with the names of her four children that died at very young ages.

In the 1910 census, Michael is listed as widowed, having just lost Catherine that year. He was still living (and renting) on Diagonal Street. He lived alone and was working as a laborer in an “agricultural store”. Later that year, in a newspaper article on September 28, 1910, a man named Bob McKeague purchased the Michael McGuire property on Bench Street. It appears that Michael then moved to Omaha, Nebraska to be closer to his children and grandchildren.

Michael McGuire died on May 22, 1936 at age 88 (or possibly 89). An obituary article states that he had been a farmer from Galena and had lived for approximately 26 years in the Omaha area. He was survived by his two children, twelve grandchildren and one sister (Ellen). He is buried in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery in Omaha, Nebraska.

The following pages include copies of newspaper articles, pictures, Ancestry information and photos from Find-A-Grave. Many of the earlier newspaper articles we assume were mentions of his father, and not him based on what would have been his age at the time. It was difficult at times to discern if it was father or son – or even a relative since they had the same name. As mentioned earlier, there was another Michael McGuire from Vinegar Hill who could actually be the subject of some of these articles as well. Those articles are included in this document anyway in case it was him.

Mother's donation to the Catholic church (partial listing)**

CATHOLIC CHURCH IN THE TOWN OF GALENA.

I deem it proper that the accounts of public edifices, especially when built by the liberal contributions of the people should be made known to the community through the voice of the press. The reason of this is self evident in the present case: those individuals whose generous disposition induced them to patronise the building of this Church are anxious to see it carried on in the best possible manner, and thus have the object of their liberality properly attended to: on the other hand it is just that as a mark of gratitude to them, and of correctness on the part of the Superintendent of the work, the names of said individuals and the amount of their contributions should be exposed to the inspection of all. This proceeding is not only calculated to gratify our subscribers but also to encourage all our friends to assist us in like manner.— In the winter of the year 1835, the accounts of the C. Church of Galena, were published in this paper, and as nothing very important was done in the year 1836, I did not believe it necessary to publish them again. Now that the title of the Church ground is secured, and all our engagements satisfied, it is with pleasure that we publish the accounts.

Found in Find-A-Grave for 1869 death of brother

John Maguire, a son of Michael Maguire, living near the old Soulard place, in West Galena, strayed away some three weeks ago, while temporarily insane. On the day he left home, he was seen wandering around near the residence of Mr. E. M. Bouton, which was the last time he was seen alive. Yesterday, (Sunday) afternoon his body was found floating in Galena river, near Bell's mill. He had evidently committed suicide. He was 25 years of age.

Galena Daily Gazette – March 24, 1875 – Green Street bridge proposal

Green Street Bridge.

At a joint meeting of the Commissioners of Highways of the towns of West and East Galena, at the Town Hall in East Galena, held this day, the following preamble and resolution were adopted:

WHEREAS, The Board of Supervisors of Jo Daviess County, at their last meeting, held in the month of March, A. D., 1875, at the Court House, in the city of Galena, appropriated the sum of \$3,250 toward the building of an iron bridge across Galena river, at the foot of Green Street, in the city of Galena, said river being the line between the town of West and East Galena, it is therefore

Resolved, That we, the Commissioners of Highways of the towns of West and East Galena, will, as such Commissioners, agree to pay one-half of the cost of said bridge, providing the total cost will not exceed the sum of \$6,500; and we will levy a tax on all real estate and personal property liable to taxation in each of the said towns, to the extent we are authorized by law to do, and that each town

will pay according to the assessed valuation of property, within such town. *Provided*, that the city of Galena will waive all rights and claims to road and bridge tax, which may now, or will be due to said city according to Section 16, of an act in relation to Roads and Bridges of the late Statute of Illinois, until said bridge is paid for, so that said tax collected by the Collectors of the towns of West and East Galena, shall be paid over to the Treasurers of the Commissioners of Highways in their respective towns, to be applied to the payment of the above mentioned iron bridge; and it is further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be handed to the Mayor and Aldermen of the city of Galena by our Secretary. (Signed)

Berry, daughter of the late John Berry, of Rose Hill, West Galena, were united in marriage yesterday forenoon, at 10:30 o'clock, in the presence of the near relatives only, of the contracting parties. The ceremony took place at St. Michael's Catholic Church, and was impressively performed by the Rev. Father James Hogan. The bride was attended by Miss A. M. Martin and the groom by Mr. Thos. Mr. Oldenberg escaped with a slight injury to one of his knees but Mr. McGuire was not so fortunate. He alighted in such a manner as to cut and bruise his face badly and to cause a compound fracture of the right leg just above the ankle. It is understood that a part of the splintered bone protruded through the skin. The horses went a few yards further where they stopped and went to feeding at the roadside.

Assistance was quickly at hand and Mr. McGuire was tenderly picked up, loaded into a rig and taken to his home where he received the attention of Dr. Crawford. The injuries to his head and face are not of a serious nature but his leg is badly damaged and will confine him to the house for a considerable length of time. It is the hope of his numerous friends that no permanent results may follow the injury.

He spoke of her sacrifice in early
youth of all worldly advantages, and
of what is far more precious, the
sweetest and purest affections of the
heart. He praised her life-long spirit
of sacrifice in her devotedness to the
poor, the ignorant, prisoner, the suf-
fering in every stage of misery and
abandonment. He dwelt particularly
on the services of Mother Louise
when she acted as army nurse during
a fratricidal war, when she soothed
the agonies of the wounded and the
dying of both armies' making no dis-
tinction between the "blue" and the
"gray." In addition to these works
of an active religious life, Father
O'Kelly eulogized the interior spirit
of the departed, that deep and tender
piety which crowned her career of self-
abnegation of constant union with

When she was very young her family came to America and settled near Galena, Ill., where she passed her childhood and early youth. She entered the Convent of Mercy in Galena in 1852, and made her profession Nov., 1, 1854. After some years of service in Galena Sister M. Louise was removed to Chicago and was placed in charge of the Girl's Orphan Asylum. When the Civil war broke out Sister Louise was one of the devoted band of Sisters of Mercy, who went to nurse the sick and wounded soldiers. The sisters were on the boat "Sioux City" which, while making its way with men and supplies to Mulligan's brigade at Lexington, was fired on by the Confederates in ambush, and narrowly escaped destruction. Unable to reach Lexington the sisters returned to Jefferson City, where Sister Louise was placed in charge of the Post hospital. She was afterward called to labor on the hospital boat which received the wounded and dying from the field of Shiloh.

Sister M. Louise returned to Chicago in the summer of 1862, and later in the same year came to Ottawa, where she passed the remainder of her life. During her entire religious career she was the model of self-sacrificing devotion to the cause of religion and of charity. In Ottawa her name was a synonym for all that was good and kind. In the school room, in the visitation of the sick, in exhorting and relieving the prisoner and the unfortunate, she was ever zealous, devoted Sister of Mercy.

For several years Mother Louise was afflicted with rheumatism which, about two months ago, developed into an acute malady. From that time until her death her sufferings became a veritable martyrdom which she endured with heroic patience.

Mother Louise leaves two brothers and two sisters. These are Thomas Berry, of Galena, who was present at the funeral; Mrs. Manley and Mrs. McGuire, of Galena, and John Berry, who resides in the southern part of Illinois.

Mother Louise's loss is deeply felt by the community, especially by the mother superior, to whom she was a devoted and efficient assistant.


